



Thelma M. Nelson

July 23, 1922 - February 10, 2021

Thelma M. Nelson, age 98, wife of the late Donald A. Nelson, of Royerford, PA, passed away on Wednesday, February 10, 2021 in the Columbia Cottage. Born on July 23, 1922 on her parents' farm on the corner of Bridge Street and Rt. 724 in Spring City, PA, she was a daughter of the late Milton and Bessie (Latshaw) Mowrer. She was the last of three children: Clifford Mowrer who preceded her in death and Katharine Wheatley, age 101, who resides in Rochester Hills, MI. Thelma graduated from Spring City High School in 1940, and then attended Norristown Business College. She was employed as a telephone operator at Bell Telephone, and as a clerk typist at Valley Forge Army Hospital.

Mrs. Nelson married Donald A. Nelson on April 27, 1945. After her marriage, she became a homemaker for her husband and children. She gave birth to three children: Ruth Ann Nelson-Abbott, Katharine Elaine Nelson and David Arthur Nelson.

She was a life-long member of Brownback's United Church of Christ. She had a beautiful soprano voice and sang in the choir, taught Sunday school, and served as both a Deacon and an Elder. After her children were grown, she devoted her life to volunteer service. She delivered Meals-on-Wheels for 25 years, drove cancer patients to their doctors appointments for 10 years, and worked in the office of Project Outreach for 20 years.

Mrs. Nelson was a member of the Phoenixville Senior Center for 10 years, and was a 50 year member of the Woman's Club of Royersford. Until she suffered a stroke in 2012, Thelma led a very active life. She traveled the world, enjoyed hiking, exercising, swimming, yoga, and loved relaxing in her hammock. In addition to her Church choir, she also sang in several community choirs.

“ Memories from Katharine – Thelma’s sister. (These are my mom’s recollections – when she heard that Thelma had passed away.)

“I haven’t seen my sister Thelma for the last 10 years, and was so sorry to miss her. I really have missed her for such a long time, we haven’t lived that close for many years [60+].

“I always remember the good times we had at the Poconos - We had a lot of good times together there and even had vesper times - I remember we liked to sing those songs like “We are climbing Jacob’s Ladder, and Jesus Loves Me.” I remember those days were wonderful. Then - We had the hurricane. It rained all night, and we had to shovel a ditch around the main house to keep it from flooding – Thelma and I were digging right along with the men. We were in our bathing suits. The next day Thelma and I told the kids that the lake looked like chocolate milk because it flooded so high on the muddy banks. We had to go home by putting planks across a creek because so many roads were washed out.

“In our childhood, I always took care of her because I was older. When I was a teenager I had a part time job with one of the stores that sold clothes in Royersford. Thelma was still in grammar school. I bought myself a reversible red coat – they were all the rage. And Thelma thought it was so wonderful, that I went back and bought her a blue one. She sure liked that coat and wore it many years until she grew out of it.

“But then there was one time she stuck up for me.

“When I got married I wanted to make my own wedding dress, but I didn’t have time because LeRoy was scheduled to go into the army in WW2. So, Mother and Thelma and I went to Philadelphia on the train to look for a red-dyed dress. I wanted a long dress with a train and a veil – all the trimmings. Mother said, ‘Look, that dress is very beautiful, but it is too much for us to spend, we just can’t do it.’ But I wanted that the kind of dress and begged her to get it , but she still said no. Finally Thelma said, “Mother , what if I promise to wear that dress when I get married some day?” And then Mother said yes, and , so both of us got married in that same dress.

Later in life Thelma said that she and Don wanted to travel, and she told Don that she would agree to go if Roy and I went along too. So we all agreed to try it. Thelma was sometimes scared of heights, and I would try to talk her into trying things, like the time we when we went to Machu Picchu. Our travels together worked out so well that we took many wonderful trips together.”



“ I remember Aunt Thelma as an always kind, caring woman committed to her family and her church, who contributed so much to the welfare of her community and extended family. Aunt Thelma was the matriarch of the Nelson vacation home on Lake Wallenpaupak where we spent 2 weeks every summer with our cousins and had so much fun! Aunt Thelma packed us all in the car on Sunday to find a church service near the lake home so we could get our visitors buttons to help our attendance record with our home church. She and Uncle Don took us to the drive-in in White Beauty and she planned so many treasure hunts with her sister Katharine for us kids to enjoy at the Poconos. Lakeside Doggie roasts, s'mores, peaches and ice cream, and corn pudding always make me think of Aunt Thelma. Such beautiful, everlasting, childhood memories. Thank you Aunt Thelma!
